2021/2022 Officer Elections	A. Carni presented slate: C. Koss as Chair, R. Hoskins as Vice Chair, and A. Carni as Secretary. Opened the floor for additional nominations. C. Koss nominated Megan Masten as ROC Chair. M. Masten accepted nomination.				
	C. Koss moved to elect the slate of officers as presented and elect M. Masten as ROC chair. P. Wait seconded motion. Motion passed with no opposition or abstentions.				
Input on 2022-2023 Sacramento County Budget	H. Richardson sought feedback on county's budget. The form distributed with the agenda asks for 5 top needs for community served by Commission. Shared results of 2018 needs survey to inform the discussion. Once the Commission determines the priorities, one member needs to complete the form and submit to H. Richardson before Labor Day, if possible. The results will be used to determine needs based on broader public poll.				
	A. Carni asked about overall budget allocations. H. Richardson encouraged commission to focus on priorities and needs of communities represented by the commission, not a particular budget category.				
	The Commissioners shared their priorities though the chat and discussion. Topics included homeless diversion, affordable housing, transportation, MediCal scams, 211, senior companionship, home repairs, caregiver support, assisted living waiver program, age-friendly initiative, social isolation, and volunteer support for older adults. Did a poll to identify the top priorities. After discussion, the Commission adopted the following recommendations:				

	 Flexible funding for older adults facing financial crises that are likely to lead to homelessness without immediate assistance (e.g., to pay for utility bill, rent, home repair, etc.) Creative solutions to provide affordable housing alternatives for older adults (e.g., rent not more than 30% of income) that is readily available in the near future (e.g., home share programs, rent assistance, ADU incentives) Increase support to informal caregivers by improving 211 referrals for older adults, strengthening recruitment and training (caregiving skills, language skills, or other needs) of IHSS workers, providing a living wage for IHSS workers to ensure a sufficient pool of providers, and other supportive programs for caregivers who do not qualify for MediCal Support through adequate staffing and funding the implementation of the county's age-friendly initiative Improve accessibility for alternatives to driving by removing financial, physical, environmental, and other barriers to using alternative transportation options (e.g., vouchers for Lyft or Uber, free or reduced fares on public transportation, expanding support for the Senior Companion program or similar volunteer programs to increase volunteer pool of senior companions/escorts)

March 2018 Survey: What Do Older Adults Living in Sacramento County Need?



Top Five Needs Identified in the Survey

- 1. Individual rides Door to door transportation with helper/escort: 61% (1,616)
- 2. Affordable caregivers or housekeeping help: 59% (1,575)
- 3. Affordable housing: 53% (1,415)
- 4. Help finding senior services (individualized one-to-one help): 47% (1,243)
- 5. Maintenance person or "handyman" to fix things around the house: 43% (1,147)

2661 Respondents

71% identified as age 60+
44% provide care or help provide care
31% have a spouse or partner age 60+
23% have a parent age 60+
